

From The Churchwardens

This month's letter brings important news from the wider Church of England - developments that could shape the future of local parishes like ours.

Back in 1997, the Church Commissioners - who manage the Church of England's historic wealth - faced serious financial trouble. Parishes and dioceses stepped in to carry the burden of clergy pensions. Since then, the



Commissioners' funds have soared. Their assets now stand at £13 billion, with liabilities dramatically reduced.

Meanwhile, dioceses and parishes are under severe financial pressure. In 2024, 83% of dioceses are running deficits totalling £62 million. Many are being forced to cut clergy posts, merge parishes, sell vicarages and extend vacancies - Lurgashall is one of those parishes in an extended vacancy. Clergy morale is low and church closures are accelerating.

In response, Save the Parish, a pressure group chaired by The Reverend Marcus Walker, alongside several bishops and diocesan leaders, put forward a modest proposal at July's General Synod: to require the Church Commissioners to give just 1% of the capital value of their funds each year (around £104 million as of today) to diocesan clergy funds. This money would be paid out of the

Commissioners' income so as not to touch their core endowment, but it would eliminate diocesan deficits and protect parish ministry by funding stipends, pensions and salaries directly.

Bishop Jackson of Bath & Wells called the state of parish finances "an existential threat" to the Church of England and urged Synod to support the proposal. Some Synod members, however, feared a shift in financial control and the church commissioners and their advisors warned of risks to investment returns. Instead of debating the proposal itself, Synod passed a so-called wrecking motion - an amendment that delayed the matter by calling for further discussion. By doing so, Synod avoided taking a clear stand choosing caution over the urgent needs of the parishes. It passed by 361 votes to 7, effectively killing the proposal for now.

Many felt it was a missed opportunity to back the parish system when it most needed support.

Ahead of the debate, a group of parishioners from Lurgashall wrote to Martin, Bishop of Chichester, urging him to support the proposal. He wrote back expressing his support and indicating his intention to vote with the Bishop of Bath and Wells. However, when voting records were later published, it became clear that Bishop Martin had not voted at all.

At a time when parish communities are being asked to do more with less, meaningful support from Church leaders feels more important than ever. If we don't even have the support from our Bishop to help fund a parish priest one wonders why he is in office!

What Next?

The national Church remains financially strong but local churches continue to struggle. St Laurence's as a church is well provided for thanks to the support given to the Friends, but this money cannot be used to pay stipends, and it is the very shortage of funds for stipends which is causing us to be in the fourth year of our vacancy.

The proposal to relieve that burden was rejected by those people who should be looking after us - namely the 'upstairs' church. Rev. Marcus Walker says that the conversation is far from over. He and many others continue to work behind the scenes for a more parish-focused future. Let's hope it isn't too late!

Save The Date - Wednesday 3 September

Dear LVS Shareholder,

We are writing to give advance notice of a General Meeting of members of the new Lurgashall Village Shop Limited Community Benefit Society to be held in the Village Hall at 7pm on Wednesday 3 September.

The purpose of this meeting will be for members to further consider the future of the shop. A formal Notice of Meeting will follow in the next few days.

At the meeting a Resolution will be proposed to seek members' approval to appoint professional advisers to start the process of winding up the business as soon as possible in order to preserve members funds. The Notice of Meeting will set out legal arrangements for the meeting such as appointment of proxies for members who are unable to attend in person.

A headline summary of the main issues is as follows:

- LVS fundraising stands at £71,850 vs a target of £150,000, halving the planned investment fund
- Operating losses are running at £3,000 pcm. This will be reduced to £1,500pcm when restructuring actions are complete
- LVS has remaining cash reserves of circa £20,000 (excluding members funds)
- Sales revenues are up, but not yet at the level required by the business plan
- No volunteers have come forward to join the Board
- LVS is not in a financial position to renew the shop lease

The Board has reached the conclusion that members should be given the opportunity at the earliest possible date to decide whether it is sensible to carry on the business of the shop and continue to try to put in place further actions to improve the financial situation. Thus (as noted above) a Resolution will be proposed at the meeting to appoint professional advisers in order to start the process of winding up the business as soon as possible so that the majority of members funds can be returned. The CBS presently has circa £20,000 of cash remaining (excluding funds raised from members) to continue to subsidise operational losses and to contribute to the costs and liabilities of winding up (such as reparations under the lease). Regrettably, any remaining costs will be required to be met by member funds.

We look forward to seeing as many of you as possible on September 3.

BIGNOR ROMAN VILLA

I wonder how many villagers have visited the Roman Villa at Bignor with its excellent museum and the display of its extraordinary floor mosaics considered to be some of the finest in the country - all restored and preserved under cover. It is only ten miles from Lurgashall. The story of their discovery, excavation and restoration is an extraordinarily heartwarming one.

On 18 July 1811 the farmer, George Tupper was ploughing one of his fields at Bignor when his horse-drawn plough-shear struck a stone. When he dug down, he found what was probably the water basin or 'piscina' of a Roman Villa next to which he uncovered a mosaic depicting Ganymede being carried off from Mount Ida where, according to legend, he had been tending his father's sheep. By some luck, Tupper realised immediately that this was something very special and he approached his neighbour, John Hawkins (1761-1841) of Bignor Park, to have a look. By chance, Hawkins was a mining geologist but was a man with considerable knowledge of antiquities, being 'celebrated throughout Europe



for his general knowledge on all subjects'. He had been born in Cornwall and was educated at Helston, Winchester and Trinity College Cambridge and later travelled extensively in Europe.

He was extremely excited and immediately approached Samuel Lysons (1763-1819) FSA, FRS, the acknowledged expert on Roman

antiquities in Britain and a considerable draughtsman (so necessary in an age without photography), as well as being a barrister and keeper of records in the Tower of London. Thus, from the outset leading archaeologists supervised by Lysons undertook the excavation. With the landowner being concerned about vandalism, he secured the excavation by establishing a high thorn hedge and erected a 'hovel' for one of his sons to sleep in to provide protection. Hawkins became concerned about depredation to the exposed

mosaics by weather and earthworms so that in June 1812 work began to erect a covering building of brick and local greensand blocks to keep the site dry. In March 1815, Lysons read the second of his accounts to the Society of Antiquaries, reporting that a substantial Roman villa had been uncovered and that protective buildings over several mosaics had been put in place.

With the villa only 300 metres from Stane Street, the Roman route from London to Chichester, the site became a popular attraction for those visiting the new coastal resorts of Bognor and Littlehampton and the first guidebook was published in 1815. Further excavation established that the site extended beyond Mr. Tupper's land so that permission was needed from the Rector to excavate a part of his glebe land to the west. It was soon realised that the site extended round four sides of a quadrangle covering an area of about 1 hectare,

but a mosaic depicting Medusa was found to be on common land where it was illegal to build an enclosure without the consent of the Lord of the Manor and other copyholders. By 1817, a boundary wall enclosing an outer farmyard with several buildings was traced adding a further 1 hectare to the area of the site.

In addition to conducting three lectures for the Society of Antiquaries, Lysons, with help from Richard Smirke and Charles Stothard, published a meticulous set of engravings of the villa and, in 1819, the year of his death, these were included in the third volume of his *Reliquiae Britannico-Romanae*, his compilation of Roman antiquities discovered in various parts of England.

Although excavation continued for about a year after Lyson's death, no further work was undertaken until 1925 when S. E. Winbolt re-excavated and repaired the cold bath. Further excavation was undertaken by the acknowledged archaeologist, Sheppard Frere, CBE, FSA between 1956 and 1962 in an attempt to establish the villa's chronology and further excavation continues. The original farmstead probably dates from the end of the 1st century AD but excavations have demonstrated that the villa evolved during several periods of ownership although possibly as part of an expanding family group. The initial timber-framed house with outbuildings dates from 190-200 AD. The first simple stone-built house was erected in about 250 AD. A north wing was soon added to accommodate two additional family dwelling units each containing four rooms. Although baths were begun, these were never completed and seem to have been superseded by a new, more elaborate, block. The main entrance was from Stane Street through a farmyard to the east. Between 300 and 350 AD the north wing was extended over old farm buildings and a south wing containing six rooms was constructed perhaps for two more family units. A porticus or covered way was constructed linking the east end of the north and south wings to enclose a courtyard with formal gardens and a new gate in the east wall of the farmyard beyond.

At the same time the baths were extended and most of the mosaics were created including the Venus and the Gladiators, generally considered one of the finest mosaics in Britain. All this implies the extension of the villa to

accommodate an expanding family group made prosperous by farming on their greensand soil with access down Stane Street to markets at Chichester.

Many of the mosaics have now been lifted and re-laid on a bed of concrete to ensure their long-term preservation. To achieve this

a sheet of cloth is glued to the upper surface and marked with grid lines. A long

flat knife is then used to raise the mosaic in numbered sections to be stored until the new concrete is prepared for re-laying.

It was probably the departure of the Romans in c.400 AD that signalled a gradual decline in the prosperity of the villa. We are left with extraordinary mosaics with the initials TR in one corner perhaps for the designer, Terentius. The villa now operates as a charitable trust. If you have not

done so, you should visit. The quality is amazing – a tribute to the skill and care with which the villa has been excavated.
