

Remembrance Sunday: Looking Back, Living Forward





two World Wars and in conflicts since. We remember them not only with gratitude but also with humility, recognising the weight of their duty and the cost of their courage.

For Christians, remembrance is more than looking back; it is also an act of thanksgiving and learning. At the very heart of our faith stands the cross—Jesus Christ laying down His life for the salvation of the world. His sacrifice was not for His own sake, but for the good of others. "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13). In that light, the service and sacrifice of so many in wartime reflect something of that same spirit of love, duty, and courage.

The world wars remind us how fragile peace is, and how precious. They also remind us that peace often comes at a great cost. Those who served did not seek out conflict for its own sake; rather, they shouldered the burden of duty to protect home, family, freedom, and future generations. Their example challenges us today: what responsibilities do we carry in our own time, in a world that still wrestles with violence, injustice, and fear?

Remembrance Sunday is not about glorifying war. It is about holding before God both the tragedy of conflict and the hope of a better future. That feels particularly important today. We live in a world where news headlines are filled with wars in Ukraine, in the Middle East, and in many places that rarely reach our screens. We see images of refugees, grieving families, and communities torn apart. Many of us feel powerless in the face of such suffering and division.

But Remembrance Sunday reminds us that our response need not be despair. We may not be able to stop wars by ourselves, but we are not without responsibility or influence. We can pray for peace and for those in positions of power. We can give to charities that support veterans, refugees, or those caught up in conflict. We can show compassion in our own communities, resisting bitterness and hatred with kindness and generosity. And we can seek to live faithfully as followers of the Prince of Peace, Jesus Christ, who calls us to be peacemakers in our families, workplaces, and neighbourhoods.

As we stand in silence this year, we do so not only in gratitude for the past, but with a renewed resolve for the present. To honour those who sacrificed for us is also to take up the call to live lives marked by service, compassion, and faithfulness today. May our remembering inspire us to hope, to pray, and to act—trusting that God can use even our small efforts for the good of the world He loves

James ('Jim') Bradley (1911 – 2003) "The picture that gave me the will to survive"





Some of you may know Roger and Gay Bradley who used to live at Beards Cottage (now Aldworth Farm) on Jobson's Lane and now live in Haslemere. Roger's parents, Jim and Lindsay, lived in Balls Cross, running the fruit orchards there. Jim couldn't be trapped in an office after what he had endured in life; he needed fresh air and freedom.

Jim's story of suffering, endurance and ultimate survival in Japanese prisonerof-war camps during World War II is testament to all those who fought and survived a brutal war in the name of peace.

A Cambridge engineering graduate, Jim was a lieutenant in the Sappers when he arrived in Singapore in 1942. After 30 days of action the island fell to the Japanese, and Jim, along with hundreds of other Allied troops, was marched off to the infamous Changi jail.

After 14 months, and already weakened, ill and emaciated, Jim was sent with 7,000 British and Australian POWs to work on the construction of the Burma/ Thailand railway – now known as the Death Railway.

Songkurai, a place just eight miles south of the Burma/Thailand border, contained three POW camps. The Japanese showed no mercy to their captives. Jim recalled, "We had to work 15 hours a day in the pouring rain, up to our waists in water to build a bridge." Cholera was killing 20 or more people a day, and Jim, being one of few cholera-carrying officers, was made to cut wood for the funeral pyres of the dead every day.

Incredibly, Jim and nine other men planned an escape from the camp, heading perilously through jungle towards the coast. After a nightmare journey lasting more than eight weeks, the five who survived were seized by Burmese hunters and handed back to the Japanese. The escapees were locked in a 6ft-by-6ft bamboo cage and put on display at POW camps all along the railway as a warning.

Weighing less than six stone and desperately ill, Jim was taken to the place he described as "the worst of all" — Outram Road Jail in Singapore. After eight weeks of torture, he was taken back to Changi where he remained for the rest of the war until his release in August 1945.

Through all this, Jim had miraculously kept safe the photograph of his young son Roger, his first wife Lindsay and her mother – "the picture that gave me the will to survive".

Back in England, Jim had his fruit farm, and he rented the orchards at Parkhurst in Lurgashall for many years and then bought the land and Orchard Cottage at Parkhurst for Pip and Margy Holden. Pip managed the Parkhurst orchards. Roger and Gay lived at Beards Cottage just up the road.

It took 35 years for Jim's nightmares to subside, finally exorcised when he wrote about his war experiences in a memoir.

In 1995, the 50th anniversary of VJ Day, Jim agreed to meet and shake the hand of the Japanese camp commander who terrorised POWs at Songkurai. He wanted the Japanese to acknowledge the atrocities and, if they could do so, to apologise. Jim said, "I never want anyone else to go through what I had, and the way to stop it is to have peace."

Jim died in 2003, aged 91.


THE BUSINESS INTERESTS AND PROPERTIES OF

THE PEARSON FAMILY OF COWDRAY

The origins of the Pearson family fortune come from S. Pearson and Son Ltd, a business founded in 1844 by Samuel Pearson (1818-1884) as builders and public works contractors at Bradford in Yorkshire, where they were heavily involved in the manufacture of bricks, tiles and piping. On the retirement of Samuel Pearson in 1879 he passed his share of the firm to his grandson, Weetman Dickinson Pearson (1856-1927) who now became the



sole partner of Weetman's father, George (1834-1899). Weetman expanded the business out of the north of England especially into London, where he moved the headquarters in 1884 and from where he effectively ran the business. In 1894, he became the sole proprietor and under his management, the Company became one of Britain's leading civil engineering contractors with construction work in Europe, China and Latin America. During the 1880s,

building contracts included the docks at Milford Haven, the Empress Dock at Southampton and in Halifax, Nova Scotia. In 1889, he won contracts to build the Hudson River tunnel connecting Manhattan to Jersey City and to build the Grand Canal to drain the swamps of Mexico City. From 1891 to 1897, he constructed the Blackwall Tunnel under the Thames and built the four East River tunnels linking Manhattan to Long Island for the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island

Railroad Company and many other projects in Mexico. Other major works included the Sheffield main sewer, the Tehuantepec Railway and the Sennar Dam on the Blue Nile to provide irrigation in Sudan. Through his engineering interests in Mexico, he established control of the Mexican oil industry, which was sold to Shell in 1919 in the face of Mexico's deteriorating political situation. His continued interest in oil exploration led to him participating in the formation of the Amerada Petroleum Corporation. In the meantime, the UK

engineering contracting business continued to be managed by his brother, Sir Edward Ernest Pearson (1874-1925).

By this time Weetman had acquired two huge estates, Cowdray with 16,500 acres and numerous cottages at Midhurst and Dunecht with 53,000 acres in Aberdeenshire and was created a Viscount in 1917. These estates were inherited in 1933 by his grandson, Weetman John Churchill Pearson (1910-1995), 3rd Viscount

Cowdray, together with a controlling interest in S. Pearson and Son. Since 1924, the business had been managed by his uncle, Bernard Clive Pearson (1887-1965) (the purchaser of Parham) who became Chairman in 1935 until his retirement in 1954. During this period the contracting activities were discontinued, and the business faced some difficulties. In 1941, its holding in Amerada was compulsorily acquired by the British Government. During the 1940s its main aviation interests were nationalised as were its coal mining interests and electric utilities in the west of England. In 1954, when Bernard was succeeded as Chairman by the 3rd Viscount, it had a controlling interest in the merchant bank, Lazards and a variety of other financial and industrial

investments including Westminster Press and a chain of provincial newspapers. Cowdray's achievement over the succeeding twenty-three years was to transform the Company by acquisition into a broadly based and highly profitable industrial group. In 1957, he bought the Financial Times and a 50% stake in the Economist. In 1959, he sold Saunders Roe the remaining aviation business. In 1963, he bought a large interest in Château Latour. Other acquisitions included Royal Crown Derby, Royal Doulton and Madame Tussauds. In 1967, he

bought the Publisher, Longman.

In 1969, S. Pearson became a public company, known as Pearson Plc. It acquired Penguin Books in 1970 and Ladybird Books in 1972. It was now a highly profitable broadly based industrial group. On Cowdray's retirement as Chairnan in 1977 he was succeeded by his eldest son Michael (but became

President in 1983 until his death in 1995). During the 1990s, the business progressively divested of most of its non-media assets. On Cowdray's death, Michael succeeded as 4th Viscount and continued as Chairman until 1997. In 2000, Pearson Plc sold its stake in Lazards. It now concentrates on educational publishing with the acquisition of Simon and Schuster and media including Pearson Television (now Fremantle) which presents *Britain's Got Talent* and *the X Factor* among a range of other productions.

In addition to their continuing financial acumen, the family have taken a great interest in their properties and estates, often acquired when in great need of restoration. In 1793, Cowdray House the long-standing home of the Viscounts Montagu had been made ruinous by fire and in 1840 the estate was sold to George Perceval, 6th Earl of Egmont, whose son Charles, the 7th Earl, built Cowdray Park in the 1870s as his home. He, in turn, sold the estate in 1910 to Weetman Dickinson Pearson, who restored and extended Cowdray Park. Further alterations were made in 1927 by the 2nd Viscount, the liberal MP for Eye from 1906-1918, who had married Agnes Beryl Spencer-Churchill, a grand-daughter of the 6th Duke of Marlborough. He was a keen polo player laying out the lawns which make Cowdray so well-known today. Cowdray Park remained the home of their son the 3rd Viscount and the estate is still owned by his eldest son Michael.

Dunecht with its 53,000 acres was left to the 3rd Viscount's second son, Charles Pearson. In 2010 Charles took the decision to sell Dunecht Castle with its surrounding land but to retain the 53,000-acre estate. In 1997 he and

he wife Benedicte had acquired Pitshill, the former home of the Mitford family at Tillington, which was now in a dilapidated state. They employed the architect, Christopher Smallwood to create an immaculately elegant family home with interiors designed by Edward Bulmer and a domed ceiling over the hallway by Giles

Quarme. They also created an exquisite formal garden in keeping with the house.

Bernard Pearson who had managed the business from 1924 to 1954 was also determined to leave his mark on the landscape and in 1922 with his wife, Alicia Mary Dorothea Knatchbull-Hugessen they purchased Parham, an Elizabethan manor house with 3,733 acres at Storrington. This had been the home of the Bishopp family for many generations but had passed through a succession of daughters to Mary Cecil Curzon 17th Baroness Zouche who took the difficult decision that she had to sell it. Bernard and his wife restored Parham with great

sensitivity filling it with beautiful possessions. In 1954, *The Antique Collector* recorded: 'This is a noble English home whose owners, in a single generation, have recreated by loving and knowledgeable care what usually takes some centuries of continuous family occupation to acquire.' The estate was inherited by their elder daughter Veronica Tritton who lived there until her death in 1993, when it was left to Bernard's greatgranddaughter, her great niece, Emma Lavinia Guinness, the daughter of the 3rd Earl of

Iveagh. Emma continues to live there with her husband James Barnard who she married in 1994, maintaining the ethos that Bernard had begun, although the house is now held by a charitable trust.

Operational and Staffing Changes

After the members CBS meeting on 3rd Sept, the new board worked hard to secure a deal with an independent retailer to take over the business. At the time, this was considered the only viable option to avoid closing the shop. Regrettably this sale did not proceed. Since then, a thorough review of overheads determined that with staff salaries accounting for the majority of the costs and overheads, immediate restructuring was necessary. The decision was made to serve notice on all members of staff. However, Jo Hamlyn was asked to remain in her dual role of Shop and Post Office Assistant for the time being. The Post Office is currently a viable part of the business; it produces a small income and has a contribution toward salary. Fergus Nugent will also continue to provide weekend cover. Shop Manager, Lisa Tremeer left the business on 15th October and we wish her success in her future career.

THE AULD FOOL ON TOADS AND DILEMAS AND WILDFLOWER MEADOWS......

Time for the cut to remove the annual growth from the wildflower meadow that is Whites Green – and the Auld Fool finds himself on the horns of a dilemma – not a good place for an octogenarian.....

You see it is like this – the toads and frogs are on their migratory march from the waters at Jackson's Lake where much breeding goes on.....the march takes them in every direction but in this case hundreds are crossing Whites Green. The cutter/collector which the Auld Fool tows behind his ancient Massey Ferguson uses a flail cutter which throws the cut material into a hopper – the flail consists of 200 sharp whirling blades a couple of inches from the ground – the hoppy/crawly ones are up to two inches tall.......is the problem clearer now ?

The Auld Fool gardens with The Badger (AKA Mrs C) at their home on the edge of the Green and toads and frogs are close mates – often being moved at night to areas where slugs and snails proliferate. They are not to be harmed......
